
Westcliff University's commencement ceremony took place on Sunday, July 29th at City National Grove of Anaheim. (See additional pictures below) Congrats graduates!!!

# HIERARCHY OF DIFFICULTY TAI PHAN



This study analyzes how the process of second language acquisition can be improved when considering the Hierarchy of Difficulty and the Aspect Hypothesis. The explanation of these theories as well as an insight into how these theories can be applied in practice to benefit learners will be provided. The findings of this study will justify the importance of these identified hypotheses in second language learning and will demonstrate how they can be applied in the classroom.




## Message from the Dean of Education

## **Faculty**

Professor MJ Outcault-Hill took part in several trainings and workshops, including Assessment and Institutional Research (AIR), Student Teaching Practicum Supervisor overview to policies and procedures governing supervision of student teachers during their practicum experience, and EdTPA Workshop.

Professor Jennifer Hirashiki completed the AAC&U VALUE Institute Calibration training and is now a certified VALUE Scorer.

Dr. Sheila Corwin designed a CLIL (Content and Language Integrated Learning) course which focuses on the country of Italy for content. This course will complement a content-based course which focuses on the city of Florence as content. Both courses are taught in English to English language teachers, living in Europe, who are mostly non-native speakers of English.
